Comments:

Different scenarios of support can be shown. This divorce has father with 80 overnights and spousal support will be included. If you follow Substantial Shared Parenting (SSP) + Alimony (Case 2), alimony is a very large number and taxes are minimized. Under Case 3, PRP CS + Alimony is used and father has less cash (\$87/mo, Line 6), but the financial risk to father of alimony being made permanent is significantly reduced.

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
